

Daily Report 08/17/16

In the last 24 hours Annapolis Police officers responded to 91 calls for service and arrested 11 people.

Stolen & Recovered Vehicle – 201600003616 – Unit block of Dorchester Rd – 08/15 at 12:30pm: The victim reported that he left his vehicle unlocked with the windows down and the key in the ignition for a few minutes when it was stolen. Officers located the vehicle parked and unoccupied around the corner in the 100 block of Georgetown Rd. The victim reported that money had been stolen from his wallet, which was left inside the vehicle.

Attempted Theft from Vehicle – 201600003631 – 800 block of Tyler Av – 08/06 at 11pm to 08/10 at 3pm: An unlocked vehicle was entered, but nothing was stolen.

Burglary – 201600003649 – 700 block of Crisfield Way – 08/12 at 4:30pm to 08/16 at 9pm: An unsecured home was entered and money was stolen.

Shots Fired – 201600003650 – Clay St at Pleasant St – 08/16 at 10:30pm: Officers responded for reports of shots fired and located two homes that had been struck by bullets. Officers also discovered that three parked vehicles were struck by a vehicle leaving the area during the incident. No victims or suspects were located.

Shots Fired – 201600003651 – Unit block of Bens Dr – 08/17 at 12:01am: Officers responded for reports of shots fired and located two apartments and a vehicle that had been struck by bullets. No victims or suspects were located.

Theft from Vehicle Prevention Information

In most cases of thefts from vehicles, thieves enter vehicles through unlocked doors, so securing your vehicle is an important way to prevent thefts. Make a habit of locking your vehicle all the time. Another important thing to do is remove valuables from your vehicle. Most of these thieves walk down the road, or through parking lots, and look to see if there is property in a vehicle and if the doors are unlocked. If your vehicle is empty and the doors are locked, thieves may move on to the next vehicle. Thieves look for phones, tablets/laptops, GPS units, purses, wallets, or other items such as prescription medication, so secure your valuables. Also, please call us if you see suspicious activity in your neighborhood. If you see someone walking through your neighborhood in the middle of the night, they might be up to no good, and we need to come and check it out. Don't wait until the morning to call us because if you do, they will be long gone. Please talk to your neighbors about this topic so they can join us in preventing these crimes. Submitting Anonymous Tips to Metro Crime Stoppers of Maryland

Metro Crime Stoppers of Maryland is an organization separate from the Annapolis Police Department. When you text, phone in, or submit your Annapolis crime tip online Metro Crime Stoppers receives your tip anonymously and only forwards your tip information to the Annapolis Police Department. No identifying information is ever forwarded to us. Please be assured that only your tip is communicated from Metro Crime Stoppers to the police department, not any identifying information about you. Metro Crime Stoppers uses a special coding system to protect your identity, they do not use Caller ID or record telephone conversations. If your tip leads to the arrest or indictment of a person for a felony you could qualify for up to a \$2,000 cash reward from Metro Crime Stoppers.
