

# Daily Report 09/25/14

**In the last 24 hours Annapolis Police officers responded to 91 calls for service and arrested 3 people.**

**Good News** – On September 24<sup>th</sup> Detectives from the Annapolis Police Department arrested Ronnie Downs, 22, of Glen Burnie for the shooting that occurred on July 11th in the 1300 block of Tyler Av.

On July 11th at 5:05pm officers responded to the 1300 block of Tyler Avenue for a report of a shooting. When they arrived they located Reginald Butler, 25, and Reno Green, 24, both of Annapolis. Each was suffering from gun shot wounds.

Butler and Green were in a vehicle when they got in an argument with Downs. Downs shot at the vehicle hitting Butler and Green. The vehicle then crashed into a tree. Green was shot in the arm and was injured when the vehicle struck the tree. Butler was shot multiple times. Both victims were transported to Baltimore Shock Trauma for treatment.

Through investigation Detectives identified Downs as the shooter and a warrant was obtained. Downs was charged with two counts of attempted first and second degree murder and first and second degree assault, and one count of handgun on person and use of firearm in a felony or violent crime. Downs had an additional warrant for another incident that occurred in the 1400 block of Tyler Av on August 29th. That warrant was for second degree assault and false imprisonment. Downs is being held at the Jennifer Road Detention Center without bond on the shooting charges and on \$25,000 bond on the assault charges.

There are no preventable Part One offenses to report this morning. Part One offenses are those incidents we report to the MD State Police and the F.B.I. These incidents include homicides, robberies, burglaries, rapes, serious assaults, and thefts.

## **National Drug Take Back Initiative**

The National Drug Take Back Initiative will be held in the lobby of the Annapolis Police Department on Saturday, September 27<sup>th</sup> from 10am to 2pm. It is completely anonymous, no identification is requested of people disposing of prescription medications, and people are therefore encouraged to remove identifying labels from containers.

Liquid medications should be in a sealed container to prevent leakages (ziplock bag). Other medications (pills, tablets, etc.) will be disposed of directly into the disposal box, and their original containers can be put in a recycling bin. We are NOT accepting needles or injectibles. Any other type of medication is accepted (controlled, non-controlled, or over the counter).
